

TWO SONS LOST.

Great sympathy is felt with Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Harris, of 2, Sidney Street and 34, Glisson Road, who have received news that their third son, Pioneer Bertie Archibald Blinkhorn Harris, of the Cambs. Regiment, was killed by a shell on September 3rd. Pioneer Harris, who was 31 years of age, enlisted soon after the outbreak of war, and went to France about 12 months ago. Previous to enlisting he was apprenticed to Messrs. J. Ansell and Co., cabinet makers and upholsterers, Trumpington Street, and when out of his time set up in business for himself in Mill Lane. He leaves a widow and two children.—It is sad to relate that after two years' suspense Mr. and Mrs. Harris have received new from the War Office that their sixth son, Corpl. Gilbert Neville Harris, of the Royal Fusiliers, who has been wounded and missing at the Dardanelles since June 6th, 1915, must be presumed to be dead. Corpl. Harris, who was 22 years of age, was educated at a boarding school in Biggleswade, and afterwards at the Cambridge and County School. He joined the Colours on November 13th, 1914, and went out to the Dardanelles about the end of April 1915. He had only been there for about a fortnight or three weeks before he was reported as wounded and missing.—Mr. and Mrs. Harris have three other sons serving, one in France, one at Colchester and the third at Esher, near Kingston-on-Thames.
